

- **1. An Baile Chruaich (Ballycroy):** an ancient landscape that is, paradoxically, home to Ireland's newest National Park. *Ballroom of Romance* a famous Irish film was made here.
- **2. Ceathrú Thaidhg (Carrowteige):** a seaside Gaeltacht village, where some of Ireland's most beautiful walking trails commence e.g. the Black Ditch Loop and the Children of Lir loop.
- **3. An Fód Dubh (Blacksod):** its square lighthouse played a vital role in the D-Day landings during WWII, and thousands have emigrants have set sail from here for a new life in the USA & Canada.
- **4. Inis Gé Theas (Iniskea South):** the villages on these islands have long been deserted. The islands are full of archaeological ruins and are internationally important homes to bird life and other fauna & flora.
- **5. Baingear (Bangor Erris):** anglers travel from all over Europe to catch salmon & sea trout in the Owenmore River & Carrowmore Lake. The famous Bangor Trail also runs from here to Newport.
- **6. Gleann na Muaidhe (Glenamoy):** with two rivers running through the Glenamoy area, this beautiful region is also famous for fishing & angling.
- **7. Eachléim (Aughleam):** this Gaeltacht village is well-known for its Coláistí Samhraidh Gaeilge (Irish summer colleges) and is home to Ionad Deirbhile Heritage Centre & the Blacksod Bay Emigration information centre.
- **8.** Barr na Trá, Poll an tSómais & an tInbhear (Barnatra, Pullathomas & Inver): the mountains and hills here are popular with hikers and there is a much-photographed shipwreck on a nearby beach. The Prophet of Erris (Brían Rua Ó Cearbhain) was born in Inver in the 16th century he predicted many things that have come true today.
- **9. Béal Deirg (Belderg):** a haven for geologists & archaeologists, this area is famous for the discovery of what is now known as the Céide Fields, by a local schoolmaster Patrick Caulfield. Irish poet, Séamus Heaney, wrote a poem titled *Belderg* after a visit to Caulfield's home.
- **10. Gaoth Sáile & Dumha Thuama (Geesala & Doohoma):** the annual Geesala horse races on the beach inspired John Millington Synge's *Playboy of the Western World* and Ceann Ramhar (Doohoma Head) is one of the Wild Atlantic Way discovery points.

Béal an Mhuirthead (Belmullet) is the main town in Erris, straddling the isthmus between the mainland and the Mullet Peninsula. Enjoy its shops, cafés, pubs & restaurants, and the stunning views over Broadhaven Bay to the north and Blacksod Bay to the south!
